Starting from the (presupposed) premises that sport has a constructive mission in contributing to social cohesion, education and global welfare, the conference aims to analyse in how far this claim is realistic and may be achieved.

This central question will be approached from two angles: from the perspective of the individual and sports practice within wider community on day I and the perspective of sports business management on a global scale on day II.

Three topics, sports and community building/ social cohesion, sports and (re)education and sports, ethics and business will be treated in three blocks composed of two lectures and three interactive workshops with paper presentations, intended for researchers.

A fourth block, open to a wider audience, in the afternoon of day II, will feature two introductory lectures and a panel discussion with stakeholders on the case of the World Football Championship in South-Africa.

A public opening lecture on the topic of 'fair play' is scheduled on the first evening as an introduction in the topic matter.

The conference aims to bring together an interdisciplinary group of around 10 invited senior scholars and a group of 10 selected junior researchers for a comparative, interdisciplinary academic exchange on the role of sports in society and its peace building capacity.

Format

- A two-day conference with specialized lectures and presentations and debates by national and international scholars during the day, accessible to the 'professional' community, as well as an evening lecture open to the broader public.
- The workshop is meant to be more than just a meeting of experts. The aim is to offer a platform to scholars to present their research on the topic.

Target groups

- Senior scholars working on the topic from Europe and beyond (on invitation)
- Junior scholars doing research in the topic matter from Europe and beyond (selected through call for papers)
- The broader local audience (public sessions)

Organizer

UCSIA provides an international and interdisciplinary platform that supports and stimulates academic research, higher education and community service regarding themes that express the Christian ideology in a spirit of openness and tolerance, thus contributing to a more just society. The center was created seven years ago as an offspring of the former Saint Ignatius University Antwerp. SPEAKERS' PROFILES (all speakers confirmed)

Jens Sejer Andersen, former journalist on sports culture and since 2004 director of 'Play the Game', an independent institution funded by the Danish Ministry of Culture, the Danish Gymnastics and Sports Associations and the Danish Federation of Company Sports, aiming to strengthen the basic ethical values of sport and encourage democracy, transparency and freedom of expression in world sport through e.g. international conferences with stakeholders from the world of sport.

Hans Bruyninckx, professor of International Relations and Global Environmental Governance, Institute for International and European Policy, KU Leuven

Cora Burnett, senior professor in the department of sport and movement studies at the University of Johannesburg where she has lectured for more than 30 years, first in physical education, then human movement studies and the sociology of sport.

Fred Coalter, professor of sports studies, University of Stirling, Scotland, author of 'A Wider Social Role for Sport: Who's Keeping the Score?', Routledge, 2007, investigating issues such as sport and ex-/inclusion, sports and social capital and regeneration.

Richard Giulianotti, sociologist at the School of Applied Social Sciences of Durham University, doing research in the field of sport, globalization, crime and deviance, popular culture, qualitative research methods and social theory. He has published several books on various aspects of sports, particularly in its international dimensions. He has recently completed a two-year ESRC project on football and globalization and a project on sport and peace for which fieldwork was undertaken in Serbia, Bosnia, Germany, Switzerland, Sri Lanka and Jordan.

Frank Hendrickx, Associate professor, Institute for Labour Law, KU Leuven

Wolfgang Maennig, professor of economics, University of Hamburg. His research interests are questions of funding major sports events, economic implications and effects on regional income, employment and image of major sports events, the construction and use of new stadia and arenas and their implications for the urban landscape and corruption and doping in sports from an economic perspective. He is co-author of 'Economic aspects of the FIFA Soccer World Cups in France 1998, Germany 2006 and outlook for South Africa 2010 in Eastern Economic Review (in press).

Norbert Müller, professor of sport history, athletics and sport for the disabled, University of Johannes Gutenberg Mainz and director of the Center for Olympic Research of the University of Mainz, vice-president of the International Fair Play Committee and member of the IOC Commission for Culture and Olympic Education and the Pierre de Coubertin Commission.

Jim Parry, senior lecture in philosophy, head of the School of Humanities, University of Leeds and Assistant Director of the national Centre of Excellence in Teaching and Learning in Inter-disciplinary Ethics Applied, (co)author of 'The Olympic Games Explained', London, Routledge, 2005, 'Spirituality and Sport', London, Routledge, 2007.

Roland Renson, professor emeritus, Research Centre for the History of Sport and Kinesiology, K.U. Leuven

Bettina Rulofs, scientific assistant at the Institute for Sport Sociology at the Deutsche Sporthochschule Köln. She does research in the field of sport as a means for youth social work, socialization and sport and gender and sport.
